INCLUSIVITY

AT INTEGIRLS, OUR MAIN GOAL IS TO PROPEL THE INVOLVEMENT OF GENDER MINORITIES IN STEM. HERE'S A MESSAGE WE SENT OUT TO ALL CHAPTERS RECENTLY TO MAKE SURE THIS GOAL IS BEING MET:

"Some of you may already know this, but previously INTEGIRLS used to be called inteGIRLS. We routinely employed the phrase "female and non-binary" to describe our participants, but it came to our attention a few years ago that these terminologies were incredibly counterproductive, especially in our efforts to minimize the STEM gap for minoritized genders. Actually, this happened quite explosively through a TikTok that went viral in 2020/2021; the user went through various chapter sites and pointed out the incongruous terminology used, consisting of but not limited to "an organization by girls for girls," saying "females" sometimes but "girls and non-binary individuals" other times, or simply not leaving any space in word usage for gender-nonconforming individuals. Although this video has since been taken down, previous INTEGIRLS executives developed a new inclusion policy alongside writer, activist, and gender/queer studies expert Kesiena Boom, which is now posted on the main INTEGIRLS site.

This resulted first with the change of the organization name. inteGIRLS put an emphasis on girls, and "female and non-binary" defeated the purpose of trying to use inclusive language in the first place. Female is a starkly-gendered term, and by grouping girls and non-binary individual together, the phrase assumes that all non-binary individuals are comfortable grouping themselves with women. Instead, we now either say "girls and non binary students comfortable being grouped with girls" or "girls and non-binary students affected by (trans)misogyny." These terms deflect any strict boundaries and highlight the potentially shared experience of (trans)misogyny — an intersectional term referencing either the transphobia and misogyny experienced by trans women and transfeminine people or misogyny — among girls and non-binary students, **creating a more defined**, **educated version of our original guidelines**.

Okay, so, what do you need to do? We have noticed that some chapter sites and social medias are still employing non-inclusive language, and we urge everyone to check to make sure that appropriate terminology is being used. If not, please change it or contact an exec with the ability to change it. Please message me or refer to the inclusion statement on the main INTEGIRLS site for any more information — I would be more than happy to help.

Additionally, you should make an educated choice regarding who you allow to participate in your competitions. You can either invite *girls* and non binary students comfortable being grouped with girls or all genders. The latter might seem counterintuitive, but to some it may seem contradictory to restrict who can participate in a math competition.

An emphasis should be placed on targeting minoritized genders regardless of the policy your chapter plans to adopt. If you have any questions about any of this, again, let me know.

Also, I was contemplating **bringing in a professional who is more knowledgeable about gender issues or holding a sort of public forum to discuss openly any questions you may have.** Message me or talk together in the general channel if this is an option you want. You should talk to your chapter executives regardless, and let me know if I should help arrange a speaker to meet with your chapter. Overall, we should all make sure that our inclusion policy is being upheld."

PUZZLE HUNT

PUZZLE HUNT IS RESTARTING!

Previously, INTEGIRLS held puzzle hunts, or contest where teams work together to solve challenging puzzles, with over 1,500 participants from 50 countries. We are planning to start again, already recruiting two new people to both our tech and puzzle writing team. Currently, with the help of previous puzzle team members, the puzzle writing team is working on building a new puzzle hunt interface. More updates are soon to come!

PROBLEM OF THE MONTH

Hello from the INTEGIRLS Problem Writing Team! You may not have met us before; we don't usually work directly with competitors, unlike the chapter teams. Our work is more behind-the-scenes: writing tests, making sure there aren't mistakes, and clearing up any issues or appeals as they come in on contest day!

As our contribution to the INTEGIRLS monthly newsletter, we'll be running a Problem of the Month series. This section will have — obviously — problems that you all can solve, and if you submit your answers to pw@integirls.org, you can even win prizes!

The Problem of the Month section includes six questions each month: two questions worth 1 point each, two questions worth 2 points each, and two questions worth 3 points each. These questions have been handwritten by members of our problem writing team, so you won't be able to find them online, and we ask that you don't look! The goal of the PotM series is for you all to stay connected to math while still having fun, so there's no point in searching up the answers. Do them on your own, without a calculator or any other electronic/paper aids.

Correct answers win points, and these points can be accumulated over multiple PotMs, so even if you don't win enough points for a prize this month, you don't have to restart next month. More about prizes and how to enter at the end of the problem set!

PROBLEMS WORTH ONE POINT:

Katie chooses 2 consecutive odd integers. The larger of the two is three times the smaller. What is their product?

Problem by Celina Zhou.

There exist two integers x and y such that y is equal to one more than thrice x, and y is also equal to one more than six times x. What are the two integers? Express your answer as an ordered pair (x, y).

Problem by Carolyn Cao.

PROBLEMS WORTH TWO POINTS:

Ted is throwing a dart at a circular dartboard with a 10-inch diameter. Within this dartboard, there are circles of radius 2, 4, 6, and 8 inches. The dartboard is colored black and red such that there are bands of alternating colors corresponding to these circles, and the center of the board is red (i.e. the area inside the two-inch circle is black, the area outside the two-inch circle but inside the four-inch circle is red, etc.). If Ted's dart lands at a random position within the dartboard, the probability that his dart hits a red section of the board is k%. Find k.

Problem by Scarlet Gitelson.

Rohan High School offers 2 elective sports; basketball and tennis. 424 students play tennis, 396 students play basketball, and 16 students play both sports. There are 1027 students attending Rohan High School this year. How many students are not in any sports?

Problem by Janice Lee.

PROBLEMS WORTH THREE POINTS:

How many 4 digit numbers have a remainder of 3 when divided by 8, 6 when divided by 11, and 8 when divided by 13?

Problem by Tina Gao.

The INTEGIRLS Problem Writing Team creates a bank of problems from which they choose questions to put on the INTEGIRLS tests. This year, their bank has 2023 problems, and it spans 43 pages! Of course, they number their problems and pages in correct numerical order starting from 1. In total, how many times is the digit 0 printed in all of the page numbers and problem numbers in the INTEGIRLS Problem Bank?
